TKO

Informs SC on the Dangers of Drugs and Alcohol by Lisa Ichihaga

On Friday, December 5th, Santa Clara High was treated to a program about drug and alcohol abuse. The presenters are known as Teen Kick Off (TKO), and their main objective is to inform people on the issues of alcohol and drug abuse, and recovery. SC was informed through skits acted out by the teenagers who are recovering from alcohol or drug addiction and the "scenes" they acted out were based on their own personal experiences.

Tryshie Dhevney is the director of TKO, which was originated in October of 1983. A professional actor and a recovering alcoholic, Dhevney has made a career out of these traits by getting together teenagers from various treatment centers, and helping them to gain the courage to share their experiences in the hope that at the end of the performance, they leave people wiser and less confused about the subject of alcohol and drug abuse.

The performers are Jayna, David, Shawna, and Theo. Each suffered from either drug or alcohol abuse. At the beginning of the performance each defended themselves and their drug by saying things like "It's fun to party", "All my friends do it", "I feel electric", and "I just drink organic stuff, like beer." We then follow their separate paths, which consist of a accident resulting in a fracture, declining grades, a black out, and parents who are "cool" enough to get high with their children. At the end, all

vowed to seek help.

After the performance, students wrote down questions for the four to answer. Dhevney was really impressed with the questions asked, saying the SC students seemed like people who "really care about what's going on at their school, and who are interested in serving their community."

The statistics are staggering. Every five seconds a teenager has an alcohol or drug related accident, and every 23 minutes a teenager dies in such an accident. Also, the suicide rate for alcoholics is 58 times that of non-alcoholics. In light of these facts, then, how come 3.3 million youths in the U.S. still drink? Well, the major point is stressed in the assembly was that chemical dependency is not a mental health problem, rather, it is a biological disease with is hereditary. If one parent is an alcoholic/addict, the child's chances of becoming an alcoholic/addict are 75% to 85%. The statistic is as high as 95% when applied to both parents. So you see, people are born with this trait. Some people have drank excessively at one point in their lives, but are not classified as alcoholics because they stop drinking after the crisis is gone. Also, when non-alcoholics drink, they can be affected by two drinks, while an alcoholic will be completely stable. There are three early warning signals to distinguish if someone is an alcoholic and that is one on them. The other two are blackouts (passing out for days, months, even years at a time), and a change in personality - a violent moodswing as a result of the drugs

In the past year and a half Duran Duran has lost it's not so spectacular drummer (Roger Taylor) and it's heavy-metal like guitars (Andy Taylor), which leaves singer Simon Le Bon, bassist John Taylor, and keyboardist, Nick Rhodes to put together a fifth record (almost) all alone.
