SPAIN '87

In less than one month, a few fortunate SC Spanish students will be whisked off across the world to enjoy the sites of Spain. These students are the members of the Spanish Travel Club, who have been planning the trip since September.

The trip is a two week long adventure in a European country few people are fortunate enough to visit.

During those fun-filled two weeks, there are numerous places the group will visit. First of all, after a grueling thirteen hour flight, the group will visit Madrid, the exciting capital of Spain. Such places to see are the Prado Museum, the Pastors, or various "mesones", traditional student bars. The group will also visit Seville Moorish tower, and Santa Cruz. Probably the most awaited part of the trip is the Costa Del Sol, Mediterranean. Jolado, another exciting city, and Granada, and other places the group will see.

All the trip participants will be rooming three per room in four star hotels. The meal times will be quite different from America. Breakfast will be served around eight, the next meal at three, and the last meal around nine.

As for all of you French and German students, you should know that there are not tacos or enchiladas in Spain. The food is not spicy, like Mexican food, but instead it's cooked in olive or sunflower oil. Garlic is also an important part of Spanish cooking. All the trip participants will be expected to try Spanish cuisine, such as pulpo (octopus), paella (rice dish), tortilla española (potato omelette), or buconeros (fresh anchovies).

Shopping in Spain is something many of the female participants are looking forward to. Suggested items to shop for are Lladro porcelain (Spain's best), tablecloths in Seville, jewelry, clothes (styles are ahead of U.S.), dolls, Espadrille shoes, leather shoes, French perfume, swords or knives in Toledo, hats, and ceramics.

The director of the trip is none other than Mr. Sanchez, the famous Spanish teacher here at S.C. He, along with a few other adults, will be chaperones for the participants.

Have I made any of you Spanish students envious? Are any of you now planning on taking part in the next trip? Well, you could be out of luck! There is a strong possibility that there will not be a future trip because of the loss of interest. If so, in its place there might be a Spanish Club (notice the dropping of "Traveling").

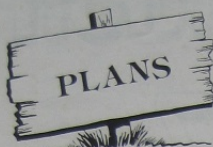

have a dog, it's Leanne's childhood dog Sunny. They so far have been unsuccessful with children but their love keeps them together.

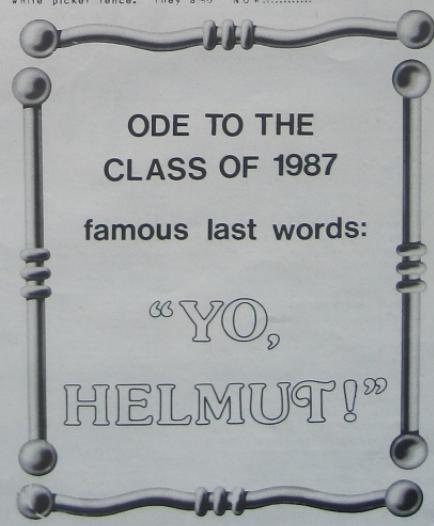

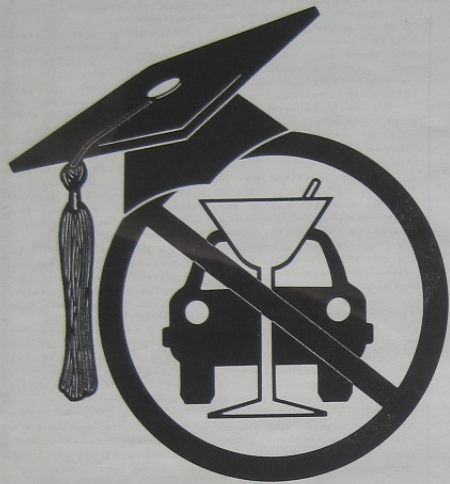

3. Insult Incoming freshman, and . . .

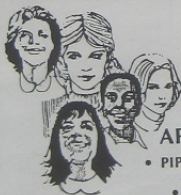
4. Persuade a member of the opposite sex that you are a sophomore at Harvard on vacation.

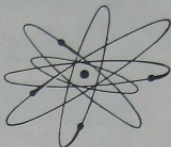
